<p>During this sequence of learning, pupils will study how religious groups contribute to society and culture across the world, how religions can bring peace and conflict and how expressions of faith have changed over time.</p>

<p>Human/Social Sciences</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Culture is made up of a range of things that a group of followers do - the way they worship, their dress, music, customs and traditions. Each religion has its own culture and experiences. • Society means a group of people that share the same culture. - At a place of worship, children and adults learn about their religion, about morals, social behaviour and their own values as human beings. Through collective worship they learn about what is safe in the world, how to be a good person, and what their responsibilities are as members of a religious group.
- Through religion, followers are given support to work out the meaning of difficult experiences and by providing emotional, physical and spiritual support.

Within religion both conflict and peace exists. There are a range of reasons behind wars and conflict taking place, one of these reasons is due to people have differing religious and moral views.
